## **Definition of Sexual Violence:**

This term is broad. It includes sexual harassment, sexual exploitation, and those behaviors commonly called "rape" or "sexual assault." Sexually violent behavior can be physical, emotional, verbal, or a combination; without the consent of the victim.

## <u>Important Things To Remember</u>:

Lack of saying "no" is not the same as granting consent; silence does not equal consent.

Consent cannot be granted if victim is:

Drunk

Unconscious

Mentally or physically incapacitated

Underage(chronically, emotionally, or intellectually)

In a prohibited relationship (e.g. incest, adultery, or in a professional relationship such as therapist/client, coach/player, etc.)

## What to Do If You (Or Someone You Know) Has Been Sexually Assaulted:

Get to a safe place

If you are injured, call 911 for immediate help

Contact on-campus or off-campus resources. Ask to talk with someone about your options to help you make an informed decision as to what to do next. Deciding whether or not to report the crime to police may be very difficult for you. It is strongly recommended that you visit an emergency room within 24 hours for a rape evidence examination to preserve evidence.
